DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1. Why do Rainie and Anita want to be dogs? What do the dogs represent for them?
- 2. How would you describe Anita and Rainie as characters? How would you describe their relationship?
- 3. The red thread is both a symbol and a physical tether. What does it represent throughout the story? Does its meaning change? Discuss.
- 4. How do Anita and Rainie's power dynamics shift over time?
- 5. How would you describe the tone and voice of the book? What qualities set K-Ming Chang's writing apart from other authors you've read?
- 6. What do you think Organ Meats has to say about the relationships between mothers and daughters?
- 7. Boundaries with wide-ranging levels of permeability feature throughout the book: The topside and the underside; waking vs. dreaming; alive vs. dead; body vs. self; even dog vs. woman. How are these boundaries crossed—or not crossed? Why are some more difficult to traverse than others? What happens to characters in the crossing?
- 8. You can read the story of the boy and the girl with the scar as a tragic tale of possession and doomed fate, or one of true love and romantic destiny. Rainie sees it both ways at different points. How did you read it? Similarly, how did you interpret the link between Rainie and Anita?
- 9. *Organ Meats* draws on folklore, ghost stories, mythology, gossip, and other storytelling traditions. How does this enhance the story?
- 10. What do you think happens to Rainie and Anita after the book ends?

HOW TO MAKE A CHOKER (FROM THE FERAL GIRLS OF ORGAN MEATS)

If you have ever wanted to bind yourself to a place or a body, you will need a collar as inescapable as fate.
